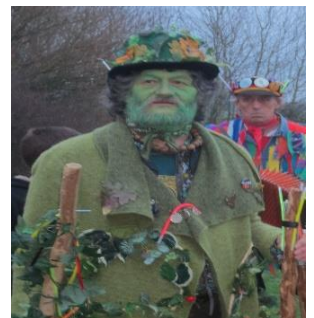

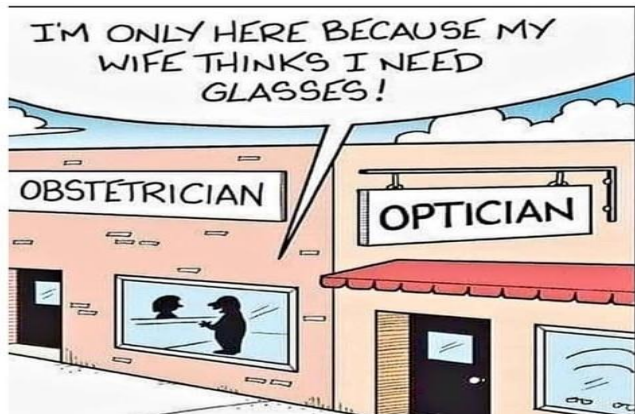
I had never heard my wife complain once - until I had hearing aids fitted.
